

Nature Notes

We woke up this morning to a lot of wind which was a little unexpected. But what with Storm Bert and Storm Darragh we have had plenty of wind to contend with just recently. Here in the garden we have not had any serious losses, but plenty of debris and broken branches littering the ground (that will all be kindling for the fire). One of the curious things about the effects of gales is that it is not always the big old trees that fall. Sometimes it is young trees which look perfectly healthy which go. Trees are much less vulnerable when they are leafless, with less wind-resistance, but if they are full of ivy then the ivy leaves act like a sail and can bring them down.

This morning's run revealed quite a number of wild flowers or weeds in full flower. You don't expect to find much in flower in December, but it is extraordinary how many plants take any opportunity to flower and set seed. There was groundsel and shepherd's purse in the field, plenty of daisies in the verge (the 'day's eye') opening up to greet the sunshine, and a few dandelions too. In the garden it is a little depressing to find next year's weeds in abundance, especially goosegrass, or cleavers, coming up all over the place – one of our worst weeds. We also have wild primroses coming into flower all over the place, and an occasional rose still coming out. Then there are the flowers that are meant to flower in winter: we have winter jasmine covered with bright yellow stars on the wall opposite a kitchen window – very cheering at the moment; we have a winter-flowering shrubby honeysuckle with small white flowers that look insignificant but which have a delicious scent to bring inside; and a delicate clematis which is just beginning to open out its creamy little bells. We have had so little real winter weather that all the bulbs are beginning to poke their heads up too.

Everyone is much more conservation-aware than they used to be. Some years ago if you listened to Gardeners' Question Time, the answer to almost every question involved spraying whatever it was once a fortnight with some horrible chemical. Now we are urged to let everything grow more naturally, not to be too tidy in the garden, relax about untidy corners, encourage our pollinating insects and provide bug and bee hotels. The Royal Horticultural Society is even encouraging us to be kind to slugs, which is perhaps a step too far, if you like us had whole crops destroyed overnight by the slimy monsters. We don't of course use slug pellets because of the birds – there's no point in feeding the birds if we then poison them with poisoned slugs – and the RHS has found that many of the typical non-toxic barriers such as copper tape, bark mulch and eggshells do not reduce slug damage. We concur with that but find it difficult to accept the advice that we have to learn to live alongside slugs and snails.

Later in January we shall be doing the Big Garden Bird Watch during the weekend of January 24th – 26th, and we hope that lots of you will be doing this too – being part of one of the biggest scientific surveys that takes place every year in this country. You only need to spend an hour counting all the birds that you see either in your garden, or from your balcony, or in the Memorial Hall open space or the Playing Field. Then you visit www.rspb.org.uk/biggardenbirdwatch and report what you see. Even if you don't see anything, that's still useful information so do report it.


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

Did you begin this month by making resolutions, and seeking a new start, or new challenges, in life? In church we begin this year with the festival of new starts, known as the feast of the Epiphany.

This is the moment when the Three Kings, also known as the Magi, or Wise Men, took their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to Christ. You may be familiar with the story from childhood Bibles, or depictions on Christmas cards. For them this journey was a new start, a life-changing time.

We can easily forget that their journey was daring and dangerous. They travelled without modern transport or amenities, across lawless, sparsely populated and inhospitable territory. The Magi took personal risks to seek the Christ-child, to look for God. What could have driven them to take this path?

The answer is summed up in one word; vocation. This was their new start. This was the thing for which they were born, the task that completed them, that gave their lives purpose and meaning. We all have one. Like life itself, it is God given. It is the role in which we feel truly fulfilled. This doesn't mean that the going will always be easy, but it does mean that the difficult times are worthwhile.

Finding our own vocation can take time. We have some clues from Jesus' teaching. For example, it will be a calling that enables us to live-out His commandment to love one another. As God is the source of our vocation, being attentive to Him is the quickest, most reliable route to finding our vocation. This is something we endeavour to do each Sunday in church. Time spent in the presence of God is, as the Magi found when the finally reached Jesus, life-changing. Although they brought valuable presents with them, they left with a greater gift, a new life infused with fresh purpose and meaning, they had found their vocation.

Playing Field Update

As 2024 draws to a close, Playing Field HQ have been reflecting on the year and have been absolutely astounded by our fundraising total.

This year we managed to raise over £7.5k for the playing field project and that's all thanks to our amazing volunteers and supporters, thank you. We've had great fun this year with a full calendar of activities, thanks to Pete, for his sponsored parachute jump that raised over £1k and to the village children who came out on a rainy July day to wash cars. Our auction in September was a fantastic night with lots of laughter and over £3k raised. We were also excited to receive a £250 donation from JSR Newbottle at the end of the year.

It's great to see the Playing Fields themselves getting so much use; from regular users Brackley Athletic to our fundraising big bike ride and, now legendary, village cricket matches. We're proud to have purchased 2 new benches for spectators using donations in memory of Vince Marsella & Conor Dowers

2025 we hope will be as good!

We've got some of our favourites in the diary; quiz night, car wash and Easter Bingo and we've got some new activities for the village to have a go at or come and look out for (one we hope involving a tractor...more to follow!)

And to top it off, our very own Cinder-Della is going to be defying gravity in May! We'd like to say a HUGE thank you to everyone who has got involved, donated and supported, it wouldn't be possible without you.





Without your support, Katharine House wouldn't exist and thousands of people would miss out on vital palliative and end-of-life care. Here's how your donations, fundraising, volunteering and event participation has helped the hospice this year.

- We provided care for 815 patients
- Our community team made 4,547 visits to patients
- 384 patients were cared for in their homes
- 172 patients were cared for in the hospice ward
- There were 2,989 bed stays at the hospice
- 30% of people went home after their stay at the hospice
- 130 people received bereavement support
- 69 patients received care from our Living Well day service
- We served 9,887 meals to our patients
- 357 physiotherapy sessions were carried out
